Making pottery started out as a hobby and has become something of an obsession. My origins of making-creating "stuff" started with sewing and then incorporated weaving. The loom I had was second hand and came from a summer camp, and eventually, the loom moved on to make room for my daughter's crib. Years later a friend suggested that we sign up for a pottery class, and although the friend never did take the class, I signed up with a three month waiting list for an opening. Working with clay was completely different. This was really starting with the raw materials and putting the steps together to make all kinds of different shapes.

The feel of throwing clay and developing a form is challenging and nurturing at the same time. Sometimes whatever idea I may have had to start with for a pot ends up as something else and opens paths to new directions that I hadn't considered before, and in the process I learn more about myself.

One of the attributes of ceramics that I find appealing is the potential for endurance. Today we can admire pieces that have survived hundreds or thousands of years and those pieces are still as beautiful if not more so as when they were made. The history of a culture communicates to our present through the work of a potter. Before I began learning about ceramics I saw a picture in National Geographic of a plate from Czarist Russia that was two hundred years old, and it was fabulous. Wouldn't it be extraordinary to be able to make something beautiful that could last so long, I thought? Well, after a number of years I am able to make pottery, albeit not yet as spectacular as that plate, but, I hope to reach that level of achievement in the future.
